Dear Sam,

Thanks for the advance preview of the article. There are a few changes I would recommend here and there.

First off, we use the spelling HikaNation for the event.

Since we will be hiking in a convaluted fashion across the country, the actual mileage of the hike has not yet been officially tallied up. It would be safe to say "an over 3,000 mile odyssey that begins..."
We not only want to publicize the need for more hiking trails, but also the activity of hiking by individuals and families as healthy and energy-saving.

In your third paragraph, you might say "noted chemist and Nobel Laurate Dr. Glenn T. Seaborg." The use of the word "wanderers" in that paragraph connotes no specific goal (as in wandering around aimlessly); perhaps a better word would be simply "hikers" or "trekkers". The actual route of the first day has been changed. We leave the Polo Grounds and head out to the beach, then north to Cliff House, through Land's End, Baker Beach, Presidio, the Golden Gate Promenade along the Bay, Fort Mason, and the Embarcadero to parking lots near the Bay Bridge. This gives us a more scenic opening day than traversing city streets.

The crossing of the Bay Bridge on the top deck is a singular event because this is the first (and probably only) time lanes on the top deck will be closed for foot traffic. Also, this is the first time that ordinary walkers (not runners in a marathon) will have the bridge open to them. Unlike the Golden Gate bridge, no one has ever walked the entire length of the Bay Bridge since it opened in the late 30's.

The crossing of the Sierra will be done in the late spring over traveled roads, so the snow conditions could be considered to be "spring snow". Heavy winter gear probably will be unneeded and will constitute extra weight. If weather conditions become serious there will be many places to hole-up until it blows over as the route will virtually parallel Highway 50 up and over Echo Pass. Once over the Pass and out of the Sierra, mild spring conditions are expected.

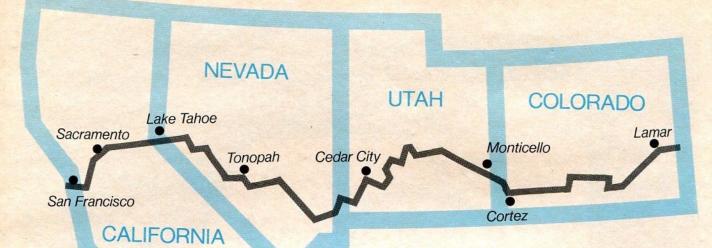

In the caption for the mounted policeman picture, again Dr. Glenn T. Seaborg.

I'll keep you posted on events as they transpire. Again, thanks for the copy of the draft article.

Cross-country hike...join up for a day or more

Saturday, April 12, is kick-off day for what may well be the longest mass hike of the decade: a 4,500-mile odyssey called HikeaNation that begins in San Francisco and ends a year later in Washington, D.C.

Who would go on such a trek? Not many. But many more hikers might join in for a day or two, or even a week. That's the expectation of the sponsors, the American Hiking Society (AHS) and the U.S. Department of the Interior, who want to publicize the need for more walking and hiking trails in our increas-

ingly concreted nation.

The 265-mile, 24-day stretch across California has been devised and walked by noted chemist Glenn T. Seaborg. He and his fellow walkers (possibly 10,000 strong) will assemble at the polo field in Golden Gate Park on April 12, before 10 A.M. After preliminary ceremonies, the group will proceed 11 miles through the Presidio to parking lots near the Bay Bridge (through hikers can sleep here).

Next day begins at 6 A.M. with a 7-mile walk across the Bay Bridge, if present plans jell. Some 15,000 people are ex-

pected to take advantage of this unique opportunity. For the occasion, two lanes of the top deck will be closed to car traffic. For those wanting to return to their cars afterwards, city buses, BART, and AHS-arranged shuttle buses are all possibilities (bus and BART pickup points are near the east end of the bridge).

Those continuing on will proceed 8 miles to overnight campsites in the East Bay hills. Succeeding days bring hikes of 8 to 15 miles as the group passes through Brannan Island, Folsom, Placerville, Kyburz, and Echo Summit. More than half of the route is on trails, fire roads, and lightly traveled back roads; busy highways and city streets are used only when there's no reasonable alternative.

You can join the trekkers any day. Cost to register for the opening weekend is \$3, payable at tables at the starting point on either day. Registrants get a patch, itinerary details, a star clock, and possibly discount coupons for shops and restaurants. Overnighting sites range from parks and campgrounds to ranch meadows. You'll have to bring your own food and personal gear, sleeping bag, and tent or waterproof cover. The Sierra crossing may require cold-weather clothing.
