HIKANA TION

By the time this issue of American Forestry is printed that part of the Appalachian Trail that lies within the state of Virginia § 500 miles-one-fourth of the entire Trail) will have witnessed the passa ge of a very wavenus unusual group of hikers. This would be the HikaNationg band of 55 people who left San Francisco on April 12, 1980 heading east across trails and roads of America to publicize the plight of hikers generally in their quest to obtain more and better hiking trails. The Trail has seen hundreds of "2000 Milers" but this will be a "4000 Miler" group. A "real example of an extended family" is the way Jim Kern, president of the American Hiking Society, the hike's sponsor, describes the group. Kern, who hiked with them in mid American over the Christmas holidays commented that it will be a very emotional experience when the group comes to a parting of the ways as they dip their feet in the Atlantic Ocean on May 30 the planned completion date of the ocean to oceans adventure.

Some 7000 people hiked with the HikaNation group as they made the first pedestrian crossing ever allowed over the Bay Bridge from San Francisco to Berkeley Cal. Another several thousand people are expected to congregate in Harpers Ferry along the Chesapeake & Ohio canal towpath WV to accompany the group on their four day trak/into Washington DC. inconsisting and to participate in celebrations planned in the nation's capitol on May 16.

Another "first" peddestrian crossing, that of the Chesapeake Bay bridge, as is expected to take place as the group leaves Washington and proceeds to its final destination to Cape Henlopen on the Atlantic Ocean near the town of Lewes, MD. on May 30.
